September is Library Card Signup Month and an Abilene Public Library card is free. That's hard to beat for what you get.

With a library card the possibilities are endless. A library card lets you check out books, DVDs, CDs, use a computer or access our online resources 24/7. You can reserve items, borrow from the university libraries, and get items from libraries far away.

Folks who live or own property in Abilene or Taylor County pay nothing for your card. Stop by one of our locations (Main, South 14th or

Mockingbird) and we'll set you up. Bring a current picture ID and proof of address along with you. (A good proof of address is a utility bill or copy of a rental agreement.)
